#### A YEAR IN REVIEW

#### A Letter from Your Pastor

hinking back how would you describe the broad sweep of the year of our Lord 2022 in your life? Preceded by the pandemic shut-down of 2020 and the 2021 campaign for vaccination, 2022 was a year of reemergence and re-engagement.



The year began with the aggregate stress and weariness of the tensions around public health and public discourse being felt across the country, including in our own community. Thankfully, with each passing month, "herd immunity" increased so that for the vast majority of people, the door re-engagement was opened. Where over a million Americans (and six million people worldwide) died from COVID between March of 2020 and March of 2022, the death rates have fallen substantially since.

Where there is grief and trauma to be acknowledged, there is also a great deal to be celebrated. Perhaps especially the simple but sacred joy of responding to God's goodness by gathering together for worship, study, breaking bread, sharing prayers, laughing, weeping, and otherwise being present with one another.

Our year-long "Journey Through the Bible," started in the Fall of 2020, saw Sunday worship, mid-week Bible studies, Small Groups and Sunday School classes of all ages all walking through Scripture in a synchronized fashion. Parents and children studied the same Scripture stories, fostering discussing at home as well as at church. Weekday devotions would sometimes focus on the Bible reading for that day, and a Bible story component was added to Eastminster Children's Afternoon Music Program (ECAMP) to enrich that program.

The Eastminster family responded to the challenges across our culture by giving \$977,000 for missions & benevolences beyond ourselves, making the two-year total over \$2.25 million given. Thank you! We welcomed Drs. Carol Byrd and Ben Sloan back to Eastminster, even as we bid God's blessings on Dr. Lynn Grandsire upon her retirement and Rev. Brian Marsh upon his call to North Carolina.

Yes, there were changes and challenges, but amidst it all the Lord our God was faithful, a steadfast rock, our deliverer, the One who guides our paths and in whom we take refuge....together. Blessed be the name of the Lord!

#### **ACCOMPLISHMENTS IN 2022:**

- Continued to provide worship opportunities while also accommodating changes in health conditions over the year.
- Approved recommendations to the Session to invite guest preachers, such as Ron Hall in April, and approved guest musical concerts such as She Sings.
- Approved updates to the Wedding Booklet on recommendations from the Wedding Directors.
- Successfully served Communion as scheduled, including modified intinction protocol with prepackaged Communion elements initiated in 2020; switched to bread and juice in cups for Christmas Eve Communion Service.
- Discussed the need for a new carillon and received from Fredna Lee recommendations for a new system. The new system was approved in September, and an anonymous member of the Church graciously purchased it. The system was installed in October.
- Received report from Anna Mills Cox (Communications) and Brian Marsh
  regarding ensuring the dissemination of information contained in the bulletins
  used in traditional services to those members who attend the Jubilee service,
  where no bulletin is used. Sponsored a pre-prelude video in conjunction with the
  sound team that explained the need for silent reflection in preparation for
  worship to be played approximately five minutes before the service begins in the
  Sanctuary.

### WORSHIP & MUSIC

#### **ACCOMPLISHMENTS IN 2022:**

- Collaborated with Anna Mills Cox and Communications Committee about the sound audit for worship services raised by the Dreaming and Discerning Report. Members of the Committee met with the EPC Communication Committee meeting in November to discuss the issues with sound and received proposals from acoustician vendors arranged by Anna Mills to address the issues. A vendor was selected to scan the Sanctuary and identify weaknesses that will be addressed as soon as possible.
- Continued to work with ushers and deacons for safe, efficient seating in sanctuary and Jubilee. Ushers were trained by Bill Coggins, who shared his list of do's and don'ts with the Committee.
- Continued to support the Peace Service.
- Worked with EPW 75th Anniversary Committee on 75th Celebration.
- Dedicated the communion table in Jubliee made by Mike DaVega.
- Worked with Property Ministry and House Committee led by Sally McWilliams on beginning refurbishment of Sanctuary Foyer.

- Held a Marriage Enrichment class that followed up on the Marriage Enrichment Retreat

#### **Learning Differences:**

- Integrated our new Learning Specialist (formerly titled Special Needs Coordinator) into our programs and supported her programmatically.
- Planned and executed monthly young adult events aimed at building a social network for our transitioning youth and including others in the community with the goal of growing our membership.
- Planned and executed Alpha programming for special needs that provided weekly programming for young adults who no longer fit neatly into the high school youth programming.
- Worked with high school youth programming and Nick to allow the possibility for high school youth to meet their volunteer hours by being a "buddy" to kids who need extra social support.
- Created and gave an informational talk to high school youth on the importance of inclusion and what it means to have varying disabilities, and how we can better include those who may look, think, or learn differently than us.
- Connected parents and facilitated relationships through programs that met regularly, furthering fellowship and deepening church relationships, creating a stronger sense of belonging.

#### **ACCOMPLISHMENTS IN 2022:**

### **Learning Differences:**

 A sensory bus was created alongside a special needs trunk for Trunk or Treat during the Fall Festival. This was a big step forward in ensuring the wider Columbia community is aware of our programming here at EPC as well as creating a sense of belonging for those who are already with us and may have varying disabilities (seen or unseen).



- Plan, market, execute, and host the 2023 Eastminster Middle School Summer Conference at New Ebenezer Retreat Center in Rincon, Georgia. We will gather Presbyterian youth from around central South Carolina for four days of faith formation, worship, fellowship, and fun. It is an opportunity for middle school youth and their families to experience the benefits and blessings of Conference ministry, gathered with other PCUSA youth from different congregations, and explore our theme "Just As I Am" together in keynote, worship, small groups, and intentional recreation. Our hope is that this week will be a valuable introduction to faith lived in a connectional church where we are united by our common baptism and shared commitment following Jesus as life-long disciples.
- Use the skills that the "Journey Through the Bible" has taught us to further enhance our existing Faith Formation offerings for adults especially curriculum prep and supplemental resources.
- Maintain and support two new Young Adult Sunday School classes.
- Develop and execute a plan to recruit more volunteers to teach elementary, middle school, and senior high Sunday School.

# **NED HIGHLIGHT: JOURNEY THROUGH THE BIBLE**



Every January when we install new officers, the second question they are asked is, "Do you accept the scriptures of the Old and New Testaments to be, by the Holy Spirit, the unique and authoritative witness to Jesus Christ in the Church universal, and God's Word to you?" That is the second most important thing for officers in the Presbyterian Church to affirm – right after trusting Jesus as Savior, Lord of all, and head of the Church. The wording and placement of that question speaks to the centrality of scripture in the Christian life.

We may discern some things about God standing alone on the beach; your next door neighbor may breathlessly describe an experience of God he had on the beaches of Normandy – but none of those revelations can contradict the character of the God we know in Jesus Christ. That is why we have decided to put the communal reading, studying, sharing, and experiencing of scripture at the center of our Jubilee Year. Any celebration of God's Story or our story,

our present or our future, begins by immersing ourselves in this witness without parallel.

When the program year kicked off in August, there were opportunities for people of every age and interest to engage in Christian community at Fastminster that were focused on building up the essential things journeying through the Bible together in worship, Small Group Bible Study, Sunday School Classes and larger Bible Studies two days during the week-40% of Small Groups participated. 100% of Adult & Youth Sunday School classes participated. The purpose: not so that we could say we did, or to prove how good we are at being Christians, or to affirm how right we have always been about everything- but because the books of the Old and New Testaments are our "rule of faith and life" (Westminster Confession, 6.002). God's word to us. now.








- Managed and disbursed roughly \$882,000 to local, global, and PCUSA missions including \$635,000 from budget.
- Continued support for 8 missionaries and 10 global partners with continued financial giving.
- Continued to support 36 local organizations with financial giving.
- The following mission partners were given an additional gift out of the surplus totaling \$32,000 for various improvements to help facilitate ministry: Family Promise of the Midlands, Free Medical Clinic, Home Works of America, and Harvest Hope.
- Donated 1,939 pounds of peanut butter and other foods to Harvest Hope.

# COMMUNICATIONS HIGHLIGHT: HIS STORY, OUR STORY, CELEBRATING 75 YEARS OF MINISTRY

As far as how the book would be organized and what approach the committee would take, the answer came organically. It would be a book of "stories" in line with the theme for the commemorative year, "His Story. Our Story." essentially Eastminster's story. Life-altering memories became stories about ministries, brought to life by members young and old, and were illustrated with carefully selected photographs. 52 authors contributed and many more collaborated to make the compilation both meaningful and interesting.

Communications worked internally on design, lay-out, and edits with several rounds of proofing with authors and pastoral staff. They worked with a local printer who had the job ready to send to Nashville, TN., for binding, which can take up to eight weeks. The order of 350 commemorative books arrived the week of The 75th Gala; members were able to pick up their copies when they left the Gala. There were approximately 175 copies available for the remainder of EPC's 75th Anniversary events.

**Update:** In 2022 Rev. Dr. Lynn Grandsire, long-time Associate Pastor for Congregational Care, retired. Two part-time parish associates were hired to help sustain the work: Rev. Dr. Carol Byrd and Rev. Dr. Ben Sloan. Sarah Beasley also started nursing school and went from full time to 1.5 days. Another change in the last few years is that hospitals no longer tell us (HIPPA Regulations) when a church member is in the hospital unless they specifically ask for a chaplain or nurse to call us. Congregational Care continues to do important work in the life of Eastminster.

- The Prayer Shawl Team knits shawls or hats to give to those who need comfort and prayer.
- The Prayer Matters Team prays for each Eastminster member by name.
- Food for the Soul helps provide food in times of grief or sadness.
- Vases of Love makes vases out of our sanctuary flowers to be delivered to those in need.
- Lovebearers Ministry writes notes to those in need in the church.
- Stephen Ministry trains regularly and gives more intensive pastoral care to those in need. If a Stephen Minister calls you, please welcome them.
- Policies and procedures were revised or developed for four of our ministry areas (Congregational Care overview, Prayer Matters, Connection Keepers, and Stephen Ministry).

# CONGREGATIONAL CARE & CONCERN

## **ACCOMPLISHMENTS IN 2022:**

- Our big event, Soul Shop, was held in May and was a joint accomplishment
  with other committees within the church. Soul Shop, with the focus on
  addressing suicide desperation, really spoke to the desire to support church
  members' mental health.
- We held Peace Services every other month. The Peace Service is a service for wholeness taken from the Book of Order and Book of Common Worship to pray for those in need and focus on peace.
- We held both Grief Share and Divorce Care support groups focusing on getting through the holidays.
- Congregational Care is given by each pastor when there is a need expressed.
   Each pastor is in a hospital visitation rotation. Rev. Dr. Byrd visits many shut-in members each week. Whenever someone is sick, needs counseling, there is a death of a member and immediate family member, the pastors try to contact, pray, and provide care for those in need. On average there were 35 visits each week with a number of phone, text, and email contacts as well
- COVID Care Bags: New at the end of 2022, whenever the church was notified
  of someone with COVID, we made an effort to deliver a COVID Care Bag that
  included get-well wishes, goodies (cough drops, analgesics, and more) and a
  COVID Respite Devotional written by one of our pastors.

- We hope to continue our wonderful Congregational Care ministries (see above).
- We hope to add an AA or Narcanon ministry to Eastminster.
- We hope to add a cancer support group in late April of 2023.
- Many Mental Health issues are raising their head and we want to find creative ways to respond.
- We would like to begin a PAIL (Pregnancy and Infancy Loss) Sunday as part of our Peace Service in October.

## HIGHLIGHT: INTERIM LEADERSHIP FOR CARE MINISTRY

EPC's Congregational Care & Concern Ministries continued providing for the members of Eastminster even when a unique opportunity presented itself in 2022. Dr. Lynn Grandsire announced her retirement after 11 years of serving the Eastminster family, and within 8 months, her assistant, Sarah Beasley, would announce her acceptance into the Nursing School at the University of SC. Knowing the support bandwidth was shrinking and the needs of a large, growing congregation continued, it was time to act. A congregational meeting was called by Session and a Search Committee was selected and approved by Eastminster to find a new Associate Pastor for Congregational Care and Concern. By the end of 2022, the Search Committee, chaired by Pam Halligan, had done extensive research as far as exactly what the role entailed, so that they could lead an appropriate search for the right person for the Care ministries of Eastminster.

In the interim, Dr. Carol Byrd who had served as EPC's Parish Associate for Care from 2019 to 2020, had already committed to returning to Eastminster, which was a timely blessing! Carol was able to help greatly bridge the gap -with visitation in particular- ministering to the elderly and sick at various locations. Hers was a familiar, kind face that members and staff welcomed. If you have had the privilege of meeting Carol even by phone, you know that she has a way of putting people at ease, which is a wonderful gift for anyone serving in Congregational Care. Welcome back, Carol!

Dr. Ben Sloan, also no stranger to Eastminster, accepted a position on staff in 2022 as an Interim Associate Pastor for Congregational Care & Concern. Ben is a child of Eastminster and attended the Day School. Dr. Ernest Thompson, Jr., was one of the senior pastors that Ben remembers from his childhood and youth. During an early staff meeting, Ben spoke of Eastminster's being thought of amongst other churches in Columbia and around SC "as one of, if not the best, Presbyterian churches in the state" saying that he was grateful to be here. One event at the end of 2022 really stands out for our Senior Ministry. A Christmas gathering was planned by Mary Baldauf and Laura Long and held in the Adult Reception Hall. Ben Sloan provided festive entertainment playing his guitar and leading the carols. It was obvious that Ben was right at home and fitting in wonderfully!

# CHRISTIAN LIFE CENTER (CLC)



- Maintained the \$60 annual membership fee for non-EPC members.
- Offered 14 weekly fitness classes (up from the 10 classes in 2021). Introduced a \$35 "Monthly Class Pass" that allows members to participate in an unlimited number of classes for 30 days.
- Purchased a new treadmill for the fitness area of the CLC to replace one that was in disrepair.
- Added several new volunteers to our CLC Front Desk Volunteer program.
- Completed the Eastminster Youth Basketball League in early March 2022. 340 youth participating on 36 different teams, from 2nd 12th grades, boys and girls.
- Began competing in the Christian Youth Basketball League once again in November 2022. Approximately 300 youth participating on 30 teams, grades 2nd - 12th grades, boys and girls. These youth represented EPC during the 2022-23 CYBL season.
- Purchased several dozen new youth and adult basketball jerseys for use in the CYBL and Steve Bates Basketball League.
- Reinstated the Steve Bates Basketball League where we had 55 adult men playing on 6 different teams (Saints, Disciples, Witnesses, Deacons, Preachers, and Shepherds) that competed from late March through mid-May.
- Brought the craze of pickleball to EPC in July 2022. Initially, we only played Tuesday evenings from 5:30-8:00 pm, but because of the demand, added Monday evenings as well, from 5:30-8:00 pm. Once youth basketball started, we moved pickleball to Monday mornings from 8:30-11:00 am.

# CHRISTIAN LIFE CENTER (CLC)

#### **ACCOMPLISHMENTS IN 2022:**

- In our ongoing efforts to improve the décor and overall condition of the Game Room, we installed three sofas, two chairs, and a table that were placed in front of the our new TV. Also, added a high top table with six chairs.
- Hosted two Red Cross blood drives, where we collected approximately 35 units of blood at each one.

- Continue to provide a basketball league for 2nd 12th graders.
- Continue \$60 membership fee and scholarship options for guests of the CLC who are not members of EPC.
- Re-implement our personal trainer program.
- Continue to offer and improve pickleball by adding convenient times of play to the schedule.
- Provide pickleball lessons as a service to those who do not know how, but would like to learn to play the sport.
- Replace at least one piece of equipment as part of an ongoing improvement process.
- Have fitness equipment serviced and cleaned quarterly by Commercial Fitness.
- Host at least two Red Cross blood drives.
- Continue to develop the Game Room as an improved gathering space for groups and individuals.
- Improve the lobby to be more inviting and engaging.
- Provide new and continued opportunities for spiritual, physical, and social development.
- Update and maintain the CLC area of EPC's new website.
